

## ALTRINCHAM,

AND THE VILLAGES OF ASHTON-ON-MERSEY, BOWDON, CARRINGTON, DUNHAM, LYMM, PARTINGTON, TIMPERLEY, WARBURTON, AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**ALTRINCHAM** is a clean market town, in the parish of Bowdon and in the hundred of Bucklow: it is 183 miles from London, 30 from Chester, 9 from Stockport, and 8 from Manchester. The chapel of ease (to Bowdon) is a brick erection, built by subscription in 1799. In its external and internal appearance it possesses nothing remarkable, but is plain and neat, correspondent with the appearance of the town, which is that of uncommon cleanliness, and through which an air of quiet comfort and respectability is pleasingly apparent. The curacy of the chapel is in the presentation of the vicar of Bowdon, and the Rev. Oswald Leicester is the present incumbent. Here are also chapels for the Wesleyans, unitarians, and those of the new connexion; two Sunday schools and a savings bank. A court leet is held by the Earl of Stamford and Warrington, (who is lord of the manor), when the mayor and constables are chosen for the whole barony of Dunham. Although the chief officer is dignified with the title of mayor, he does not exercise any magisterial functions. The privileges attached to this town were granted by *Hammond de Massey*, in the time of Edward I, when a *gild mercatory*, i. e. a society for free traffic was granted to the townsmen, and freedom from tolls throughout the barony, right of pasturage, &c. Dunham park is the principal seat of consequence in the immediate neighbourhood, but there are many delightful residences possessed by opulent individuals which border the town, the gardens of which are laid out with great taste. The town is about a mile in length, at the extremity of which passes the Duke of Bridgewater's canal, where is also the Navigation Inn and Packet House, where passengers receive every accommodation while waiting for the packets. Here are some manufactures of thread, woollen yarn, bobbin turning, &c. and a power loom factory; but agriculture is the chief employment of the labouring class here, the produce of the gardens, &c. assisting to supply the Manchester markets. The situation of the town is dry and healthy, the views, upon the high grounds about Bowdon, extensive and pleasing, and the soil remarkably productive. Market day is on Tuesday. Fairs are April 29th, August 5th and 6th, and November 22nd, principally for cattle, toys, &c. The population, in 1821, was 2302, but it has since increased to about 3000.

**ASHTON-UPON-MERSEY**, in the hundred of Bucklow, is 7 miles south of Manchester. In the reign of Henry

IV. a portion of the manor was held by the Carringtons. The other portion descended, through various possessors, to Viscount Allen, who, in 1749, sold it to George Earl of Warrington. The present Earl of Stamford and Warrington is now the proprietor of the entire manor, for which a court baron is held. The *Old Watling-street*, leading to the ford over the Mersey, adjoins this township. The church is rather a handsome building of stone, with a nave and chancel, and at the west end a small belfry. There are but few monumental memorials in this church, and none that claim particular notice. The entire advowson became, by purchase, the property of the Rev. R. Popplewell Johnson, who is the present patron and rector. The township of Ashton-upon-Mersey contained, in 1821, about 900 inhabitants.

**BOWDON**, or *Bowden*, is a scattered village and parish, beautifully situated on an elevated piece of land, washed on one side by the river Bollin and on another by the Duke of Bridgewater's canal; lying on the left of the main road from Manchester to Knutsford, about ten miles from the former, five from the latter place, and about a mile and a half from Altrincham, in the hundred of Bucklow. A short distance east of the village is the extensive and rural park of Dunham Massey, of which mention is made in the account of Dunham. After the dissolution, the estate of Bowdon was attached, together with the church, to the bishopric of Chester; and afterwards the lands were divided, but the advowson of the church still continues vested in the bishops, which, with the remaining lands, are held on lease by the Earl of Stamford and Warrington. The manor is within the leet of Dunham Massey. The church, which, it is said, existed previous to the conquest, stands on very high ground, and is of Gothic structure, consisting of a nave, chancel, and side aisles, the ceilings of which are neatly carved in oak. From the summit of the tower (which contains six bells) the views are extensive and beautifully picturesque, the land being clothed with fine timber and highly rich in cultivation. Several handsome monuments are in the church, amongst which may be particularized two in the Dunham chancel, one to the memory of Langham and Henry Booth, younger sons of Henry Earl of Warrington—date 1724—6. The other to Henry Booth Earl of Warrington, the inscription on which states that this nobleman was tried for high treason, in 1685, and

acquitted: he died in 1693. There are also, in the Carrington chancel, curious whole length figures of William Brereton, of Ashley, and his wife, with seven kneeling figures beneath—date 1627-30. In the nave is a handsome monument, by Westmacott, to the members of the Assheton family, with a female figure elegantly executed—date 1759-74. Many other ancient respectful mementos add an interest to the interior of this church. The present vicar is the Rev. William Henry Mann, A. M. There is an ancient grammar school here, to which a bequest was made, in 1600, by Edward Vawdry, of £4. per annum: in 1806 the school-house was rebuilt. There are also charity schools at Seaman's Moss and Little Heath, endowed by Mr. Walton, with the interest of £1000. The soil throughout this parish is principally of a light and sandy nature, peculiarly favourable to the growth of potatoes, great quantities of which wholesome and necessary root are produced here. Bowdon parish embraces twelve townships, and contains about 7,400 inhabitants, while the population of the village is only about 400 of that number.

CARRINGTON is a chapelry to the parish of Bowdon, in the hundred of Bucklow, distant about three miles and a half N. W. from Altrincham. It is not noticed in the survey, but was held in fee of the barons of Dunham Massey, and gave name to a family (the Carringtons) which took the local appellation: they flourished here for nearly 400 years; and the estates eventually passed to the Booths, in Elizabeth's reign, by the marriage of Sir George Booth, of Dunham, to Jane, sole heiress of John Carrington, Esq.; he having no issue by her, the property was recovered or rather secured to him by a tedious law suit. The entire township is now possessed by the Earl of Stamford and Warrington. Here is a chapel of ease, under Bowdon, in the patronage of the earl: the curacy is perpetual, and the incumbent is the Rev. O. Leicester. The population of the chapelry is about 550.

DUNHAM MASSEY is an agreeable village and township in the parish of Bowdon, about ten miles from Manchester, on the right of the road through Altrincham. It is skirted on one side by the beautiful park of Dunham, which divides it from the village of Bowdon, and is washed on another side by the waters of the Duke of Bridgewater's canal. Dunham Massey takes its name from Hamon de Massey, the first baron, who existed prior to Edward I. Through various descendants and conveyances the estates have become possessed by the present Earl of Stamford and Warrington. This village has neither church or chapel; nor is there any manufactory here. The principal objects of attraction are the park, and the mansion of Dunham; the latter is a large brick building, of quadrangular form, and contains a collection of paintings familiar to all admirers of the fine arts; amongst the portraits are rare specimens from the pencils of Hans Holbein, Jansen, Vandyke, Sir Peter Lely, Sir Godfrey Kneller, &c. The family plate is said to excel, in splendour and value, most in the kingdom. The parks, which abound with fine lofty timber, give pasturage to more than 500 head of deer. The grounds are much frequented by parties from Manchester and its neighbourhood: joyous groups may be seen, on a summer's day, solacing themselves upon the verdant sward, beneath the umbrageous foliage, or rambling amidst the cool recesses of this truly sylvan scenery. There is still a heronry here: and ancient records state that, in the reign of Henry II, a castle was held here, by Hamo de Massey, who withstood the attacks of that monarch. Not a relic now remains of the structure, nor can its site be satisfactorily pointed out. Here is a comfortable inn (the Dog i'th' Wall) well situated, to afford refreshment and accommodation to the holiday visitors. The population of the village is about 1100.

LYMM, or *Lymme*, is a village and parish in the hundred of Bucklow, about five miles east from Warrington, on the Knutsford road. The church, of which the Rev. Bertie E. Johnson is the rector, is of great antiquity, dedicated to the Virgin, and consists of a nave, chancel, and side aisles, with a strong tower: there are two chancels, one belonging to the Domvilles, the other to the Warburtons. The steeple was rebuilt in 1521. But few monuments adorn this church, and none of great antiquity or possessing much interest. The edifice stands upon elevated ground, and is the best point from which the scenery of the neighbourhood can be contemplated; which is varied, picturesque, and heightened in beauty by several fine falls of water, from an extensive mill dam, into a romantic vale, where they join the stream of the Dane. This mill was some time ago used for splitting iron. *Lymm* hall, commandingly situated, the seat of Robert Taylor, Esq. is a building of considerable antiquity, partially moated. The bay windows of the principal entrance room have some fine specimens of stained glass. Opposite the gates is the ancient cross, the lower steps of which are cut in the solid rock. Dane bank, formerly the residence of the Halsteads, is now the seat of James Wyld, Esq. Oughtrington hall, the seat of Trafford Trafford, Esq. is a handsome building, commanding fine prospects of the country round. This is a very ancient family, and one of those who opposed themselves to an invasion of the Normans. There is a free grammar school here, endowed in 1698, by Sir George Warburton, and William Domville, Esq. The school house, which is of stone, is near to the church. There is also an establishment for clothing the poor, which is endowed with about £40. per annum, and is divided every new year's day. The tithes of the parish are taken generally, and equally divided by the two rectors, who perform divine service alternately. The parish of *Lymm* includes the hamlets of Brown Edge, Heatley, Oughtrington, Reddish, and Statham, containing a population of about 2,100 persons.

PARTINGTON is a small township and village, in the same parish and hundred as Altrincham, about four miles N. W. from that town. This township was anciently of the fee of the barony of Dunham Massey, and it is now vested in the Earl of Stamford. Partington hall is now occupied as a farm house. The only place of worship here is a meeting-house for dissenters. Partington is but of little consequence in the way of trade, and the only manufactory established in it is that for paper, by Messrs. James Greaves & Co. at Mill bank. The population is about 450.

TIMPERLEY is a township in the same parish and hundred as Partington, about eight miles and a half N. N. W. from Knutsford, and is also united to the Dunham estates. Timperley hall, the residence of Joseph Sutton, Esq. is a handsome modern brick building, in a very pleasant situation. AGDEN, a part of this township, is about three miles distant, where is the hall, which is now going fast to decay. The township of Timperley contains about 700 inhabitants.

WARBURTON, a parish and village in the hundred of Bucklow, is about nine and a half miles N. W. from Knutsford and six and a half from Warrington. The estates are possessed by the Warburtons, who hold courts leet and baron for the manor; the advowson of the church is also vested in the same family. Near the bank of the river Mersey stands the church, which consists of a brick tower at the west end, and a nave, chancel, and side aisles; parts of the edifice bear marks of considerable antiquity, but the period in which it was erected does not appear; it is supposed to have existed so long since as the priory of Warburton, the history of which has nearly passed away, and its site not to be distinguished. About ten years since three stone coffins, lying on the north side of the church, were examined, and in one was found a remarkably large human skeleton. The coffins bore undoubted marks of great age, and were supposed to contain the remains of some of the canons of the former monastic establishment. The Rev. Edward Lloyd is the present incumbent. The population of Warburton parish, in 1821, was somewhat under 600.

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POST OFFICE, New-street, ALTRINCHAM, William Knowles, *Post Master*.—The KNUTSFORD mail is despatched at nine in the evening, meeting the LONDON and BIRMINGHAM mails, and arrives at five in the morning.—The MANCHESTER mail is despatched at five in the morning, and arrives at nine in the evening.—A foot post, from WARRINGTON to LYMM, every morning (Sunday and Tuesday excepted), and returns at twelve at noon.—Office hours from seven in the morning until half-past eight in the evening.
